On behalf of the YES staff, welcome to the 2022-2023 school year! We are excited about the possibilities the year holds! All of us are working enthusiastically for your students' success.

Part of the incredible culture at YES comes from our practice of SPARRK, the acronym for the character traits that we demonstrate and practice through our actions. These are Environmental Steward, Positive Team Player, Academic Master, Responsible Citizen, Resourceful and Kind.

All YES students have already acted as Environmental Stewards by participating in the YES annual September cleanup of the Yuba River.

SPARRK was adopted as the YES PBIS, or Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports initiative after parents, teachers, staff, and council members worked together to identify the values they wanted to model and teach YES students. The COD president at that time, Jackie Stanfill, synthesized the work and created the SPARRK acronym. Paul McGovern, a YES COD member, characterized it as . . . "perhaps the best work we did as a council".


Rafting the Yuba River

This October, Allison Leininger's fourth graders went rafting in the local Yuba River. With the help of the South Yuba River Citizens League, they learned about salmon life cycles and their spawning ground, restoration efforts and the importance of preservation, as well as the effects of hydraulic mining on the river over the years. Starting at Parks Bar and floating downriver 4.5 miles to Sycamore Ranch Park, secondtime chaperon Dawn Kaundart was able to point out the fish, waterfowl, and new growth along the banks to the students as the Naturalists provided further information. Leininger's class has been studying the changes to our local watersheds that were caused by hydraulic gold mining, saying "It was so valuable for them to be able to see the impact still today firsthand. We even got to see a restoration project in progress". Witnessing the impact in person creates a clear visual, helping the students to better understand the impacted watersheds and the effect on the endangered salmon and other life present in the river. They even saw salmon spawning; one of her students Silas Schroder said that "It was so cool to see the living salmon and the skeleton of the salmon that has been eaten". Another student named Lexi Walchesky enjoyed it when "We learned how the bugs (BMI's) can tell us about the water quality". Seeing the things they are learning about in a more hands-on environment also prepares them for some of the activities done during YES's annual fifth grade trip to Shady Creek Outdoor School. This river rafting trip was a once in a lifetime experience for some of these students according to Leininger, making this an incredible and memorable excursion for everyone involved.



Snack Time: Eating Local Produce at YES Charter Academy

This year, YES was awarded the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program Grant (FVVP) thanks to the diligent efforts of Business Administrator and Grant Author Debbie Campbell. This equips the school with \$10,000 towards fresh produce. Sourcing from farms in Oregon House, Dobbins, Loma Rica, Marysville, and Gridley, the fresh, local, and organic fruits and vegetables are offered a minimum of three times a week during recess. The school also has the option to cook the produce once a week. According to Sheila Rolfer, the Farm to School Procurement Coordinator, her offerings have become increasingly popular with the curious children playing outside during their recess breaks. A key part of this grant is offering education about local and seasonal produce, informing our children of the benefits and importance of them; as the seasons change, the produce available shifts and provides a new opportunity for education. Rolfer is passionate about teaching our students about the environment and draws inspiration from Alice Waters' Edible Schoolyard, both a book and an actual place. After visiting its location at Berkley's Martin Luther King Middle School, Rolfer came away highly inspired. Discussing the grant and its benefits, Rolfer concludes that "...big farming is damaging our environment and locally grown food is a win-win for our health, our community and our planet". The FFVP grant awarded to YES allows for students to learn more about the environment and how it benefits us and our communities. all while enjoying healthy, local fruits and vegetables.

YES's New Electric Bus

Continuing our efforts towards an environmentally sustainable school, YES Charter Academy has purchased its first electric bus this year. Debbie Campbell, the YES Business Administrator, was fortunate enough to pursue funding through the Feather River Air Quality Management District and Pacific Gas and Electric for both the bus and the backordered charging station. This bus guarantees a reduction in the YES carbon footprint, maintaining our commitment to environmental sustainability. The use of an electric bus reduces costs and provides higher efficiency than the typical dieselpowered bus, making this decision beneficial to both the school and environment. The acquisition is hopefully just the beginning of multiple buses in use at YES. Transportation Director Mikela Amaral says that she is "...very excited to get it on the road [more], get familiar with the bus, and start picking up the students who are excited to ride in it". She also notes that the electric bus felt like the next important step for the school to take. YES Charter Academy continues to spearhead important environmental initiatives within our local communities with each new school year, providing inspiration for other schools to adopt similar practices.
